"With the joining of our two practices, we will have the unique ability to provide a comprehensive range of residential and outpatient services within one organization that enables us to further customize treatment according to what is best for each individual client," said David M. Kniffen Jr., co-founder and president of Enterhealth. "We don't know of any addiction treatment provider in the United States that approaches and treats addiction as a chronic medical disease, offers the range of treatment and recovery care we provide for any and all stages of addiction, and provides this care under the direction of four addiction psychiatrists and other professionals who are specially trained and licensed in addiction disorders. This is one more integral step we've taken to fulfill our vision of developing a comprehensive, science-based addiction management program that provides people with alcohol and drug addictions their best chance for achieving true, lasting recovery."

According to Kniffen, Enterhealth and the Urschel Recovery Science Institute have been long-time collaborative partners, both specifically designed to translate into real world practice the research-based findings of the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and other leading national research organizations that have defined addiction to be a chronic brain disease.

Dr. Harold Urschel III, a board-certified addiction psychiatrist and founder of the Urschel Recovery Science Institute, also is a co-founder of Enterhealth and its chief medical strategist. Dr. Urschel helped Enterhealth develop its science-based addiction management protocols, clinical treatment components and its innovative, industry-first e-learning support service.

"Our practices have worked well together to provide comprehensive addiction treatment for a long time, delivered with the same approach and mindset as an internist would treat a diabetic patient," said Dr. Urschel, who is the author of the *New York Times* best-selling book, "*Healing the Addicted Brain*" in which he provides accurate, scientifically-based information about the latest advances in the medical treatment. "We deploy everything science, the NIH and the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) evidence-based models teach and wrap it with a very strong recovery support program. Joining our two organizations together as Enterhealth will enable us to better serve our clients and provides us with the unique ability to 'step up or step down' the degree of care that an individual patient needs. - Intensive individual therapy, family therapy, group therapy, online educational support tools, wellness and nutrition programs that are all vital for helping an addict become healthier and sustain sobriety
- Treatment and recovery services coordinated with other providers, psychiatrists, psychologists and counselors for their patients

"Treating addiction with a disease-based approach is different than traditional providers who believe addiction is a behavioral or moral weakness," said Kniffen. "While our program does include a spiritual/12-step component, we also look to medical science for answers to enhance each client's individual chance of long-term sobriety success. It would have been easy to follow the status quo, but we got into this business because we wanted to provide what science has shown us to be a better, more effective way to treat alcohol and drug addiction."

After a four-year process involving more than 80 experts, the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) released a new definition of addiction: a chronic brain disorder and not simply a behavior problem involving alcohol, drugs, gambling or sex. In addition to ASAM, the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA), World Health Organization, NIDA, NIH, American Psychiatric Association, as well as many other organizations in the scientific and medical fields, now recognize alcohol and drug addiction as a chronic and progressive physical disease that attacks the brain, damaging key parts of the limbic system and cerebral cortex. Although an individual's initial choice to drink alcohol or use another substance is a voluntary one, over time the substance physically changes the brain to where the individual truly cannot stop addictive behavior even though the desire to do so might be high.
